MESSAGE FROM THE DIRECTOR

We don't drill and run.

Water is Life – Kenya (WILK) hopes to see new water and new life spring from Southern Kenya.

In Risa, three boreholes have been dug by aid groups, but the community is no better off. How could this happen? A half-finished borehole stands as a reminder that some organizations don't take time to ensure activities are completed with integrity.

In Enkong'u Narok, community members don't see a local solution to their water needs, despite it being the most urgent crisis they face. How could this happen? Years of working with outsiders who give 'things' but not knowledge has created a grinding dependency that strips people of their dignity and creativity.

How can you support water and life? WILK works with communities until water is found. It may take months, it may take years. WILK doesn't give up on a community. WILK also longs to see people free from the life-draining shackles of dependency. By training community leaders to manage their water source, and livestock groups to profit from that water, we look to a future with abundant water and abundant life.

Enkong'u Narok: Search for "Enkongu Narok Primary School" in Google Maps

The community of Enkongu Narok lies south of the Amboseli National Park border. It has a primary school and newly opened health clinic. The school plans to construct a girl's dormitory. The need for sufficient clean water is pressing and sure to grow. Community leaders have

asked us to help install a new, deeper water point. Once a geological survey ensures sufficient water is available, we'll be ready to dig.

Risa: Search for "Risa Primary School" on Google Maps

Risa lies just to the north of Amboseli National Park, near the Meet Mr. Momonyi and some of his Risa Primary School students



Iremito gate. Despite proximity to the pipeline that serves the Park Headquarters and gate, the people do not have dependable access to water. Though a local church recently dug a borehole, the project stopped after drilling without installing a pump. WILK will talk to community leaders and decide whether to complete that borehole or find another water source.

Mr. Momonyi, a teacher at Risa Primary School, said, "the kids come to school, play outside in the very hot, dusty, windy environment. They go home, sleep dirty, and come to school dirty the next day due to lack of water. They have been trying to drink the water in the drums used for mixing the concrete to construct new classrooms. This water is extremely dirty, I have to punish them so they don't drink it because they get sick!"

Lenkisem: Search for "Lenkisem" in Google maps

Lenkisem village is about 10 miles north of Meshanani. Back in 2012 WILK kept hearing about Lenkisem and their water problems. They received no rain, the boreholes had broken down and people were moving away. When WILK made a preliminary visit to the town, the high school principal said they needed water storage tanks at the school to collect the rain water.

UPDATES

Water - Quenching Thirst

Olepolos:

Since the pump and generator were installed in December water is flowing in Olepolos! Already easy access to water for Olepolos has brought huge changes. Ladies now have time to weed their own farms, so they save money by not having to hire others. In addition, they have time to earn money by working "Kibarua" - day laborers - for other farmers.

Unfortunately, Olepolos has faced management issues. Some of the money allocated by a government fund was not used effectively, creating a financial shortfall. WILK still hopes to construct latrines, livestock troughs and a water storage tank. We're going to meet with them to discuss how to improve their management, and discuss what they need to do to move forward.

Ilmarba:

WILK repaired the damage done by elephants to the community tap and pipes. The Kenya Wildlife Service (KWS) had agreed to do this work, but reneged. WILK is addressing this poor relationship between KWS and the community by mobilizing local leaders to put pressure on KWS to fulfill its promises. For now, the waterpoint established for wildlife requires diesel to operate. By involving stakeholders such as conservation organizations, WILK hopes to shift the burden of sustaining wildlife off the back of the community.

Ngararampuni:

A well was dug to provide water for this village and their closest neighbors, but it is too salty. Local leaders request that WILK help them by digging a shallow well. WILK is currently looking for donors interested in a investing in the Ngararampuni community. Total Cost: \$12,000.

Livestock - Getting a Footing

2012 saw great growth in our livestock project. Each of the groups that received a loan paid it back and has again been loaned money for 2013. WILK has already added 2 new groups to this project and hopes to add 4 more for the 2013/2014 loan cycle.

Exciting Developments in Noosidan

Together with support from the community, WILK was able to replace a hand pump with a generatorpowered one, construct a protective wall, and provide a water tank.

Noosidan member Nanyukie, commenting on the improvements:

" My children no longer have skin or stomach problems. I haven't taken my kids to the hospital in a long time. I have enough water to wash our clothes properly, like I learned to do when I lived in Mombasa and it works to keep us healthy. Since we have a water tank now we can get water at any time. We can do our chores easily and now we want to form a women's group to do business.".
